## From Snowstorms to Wildfires, 2021 Kept NSP Busy


2021 was another busy year for the Nebraska State Patrol. During the year, troopers responded to epic snowstorms, roadside wildfires, continued dangerous behavior on the Nebraska roadways, and numerous critical incidents. NSP civilian teammates also handled a continued increase in background checks and fingerprinting needs, critical work at the Crime Lab, and facilitating a move to a new state headquarters facility.

As we began 2022, Colonel Bolduc pointed to several areas where NSP excelled in 2021.

To begin, there was a 21% increase rate in DUI arrests in 2021, compared to 2020. During the final few weeks of the year, troopers made 60 DUI arrests.

In response to a massive increase in demand of fingerprinting services during the last couple years, NSP teammates stepped up. "As of today, we are caught up. Our civilian teammates in fingerprinting have done a fabulous job getting us caught up," said Colonel Bolduc.

The agency also moved into a new state headquarters facility in Lincoln this year. The move emptied-out four other buildings and brought the vast majority of Lincoln-based operations under one roof.



and North Platte.

As the Lincoln Communications Center was built, NSP dispatchers continued working. At times, the team was even split, with some dispatching from the new communications center to test it out, while others continued working at the dispatch center located at NEMA.

Once the Lincoln center was completely operational, focus turned to the North Platte center, bringing a needed upgrade to the facility that handles a majority of Nebraska's land area. A major advantage of the upgrades is that both facilities are now able to dispatch for the entire state if necessary, which was incredibly valuable during

the North Platte phase of the project, allowing work to be completed faster while North Platte-based dispatchers worked from the Lincoln Communications Center.

Troopers and investigators were involved in several critical incidents throughout the year in 2021. In multiple incidents, our troopers were injured during those situations, but thankfully, everyone was able to go home at the end of the day.

Throughout a busy 2021, NSP's team stayed focused on the our shared mission, to keep Nebraska safe. While each member of the team has a different role to play in that effort, the teamwork displayed throughout the year, at times in the face of adversity, has been excellent. As 2022 continues, that teamwork will remain vital to fulfilling our shared goals.

## Special Operations

## **Special Operations Division**

In April, NSP responded to an EMAC Request from the Minnesota State Patrol to assist during the verdict in the Derek Chauvin trail. 23 members of the Special Operations Detachment, including SWAT and Mobile Field Force, partnered with the Ohio State Patrol to secure the Minnesota State Capital and Governor's residence.

The Special Operations Division joined other law enforcement agencies from around the county at the United States Department of Defense Domestic Operations PATRIOT 21 training exercise to work through a mock natural disaster. This training took place from June 10 -19 2021. The PATRIOT exercise is sponsored by the National Guard Bureau A3 and accredited by the Joint National Training Capability Program. It's designed for civilian emergency management and responders to work with military entities in the same manner they would during disasters, such as an earthquake that causes damage, casualties, and the need for first responders. Fifteen members of NSP attended which included representatives from the Air Wing, K9, Statewide Preparedness, SWAT, and Mobile Field Force. NSP's training goal was to stress and test new leaders and familiarize Troopers with the operational and strategic levels during a natural disaster response.


The Special Operations Division deployed Troopers to assist the Texas Department of Public Safety along the southern border in response to an EMAC request from Texas. A total of 32 troopers were deployed between June 24th and July 22nd. The SOD served as a force multiplier for the Texas State Patrol through pairing up with Troopers on patrolling operations. Members of our SWAT Team assisted the United States Border Patrol agents in the field by tracking large groups across open plains. NSP accounted for hundreds of illegal aliens being turned over for processing by the US Border Patrol and seized numerous weapons, illegal drugs, and stolen property. NSP's drone team assisted the Texas Rangers drones team with several hours of flight operations.

Members of the Air Wing and Drone Team deployed to Banner and Sheridan County to support the Nebraska Emergency Management response to aid local firefighters. Both teams provided incident commanders with real-time situational awareness. This allowed leaders to track pro-

gress, assess the current situation, and make daily assignments. In addition, NSP continued its support by relaying emergency radio's across the state to equip responding firefighters.

The Special Operations Divisions Statewide Preparedness continued collaboration with Kawasaki to develop a response vehicle for natural disasters. In 2021, Kawasaki provided additional drivers training on their test track and installed other safety equipment.

Throughout 2021, Statewide Preparedness continued its support towards Nebraska's COVID-19 response by coordinating relays of vital medications. In addition, NSP collaborated with the University of Nebraska Medical Center to support local pharmacies, assisted living facilities, and other high-risk populations during COVID outbreaks. NSP's efforts helped UNMC efficiently manage COVID-19 therapeutic inventories by speeding dosage units to the areas in need.



## **CNT (Crisis Negotiations Team)**

The Nebraska State Patrol Crisis to assist with its mission. In Negotiation Team (CNT) has had addition to the aforementioned another busy and successful year for 2021. CNT has worked hard members have also attended to stay up to date on the ever changing technology that emerges to assist with negotiations and call outs. Team members have attended hundreds of hours of trainings. The team has also made it more of a priority to train with the NSP SWAT team on several occasions to implement both skill sets for successful toward the agency becoming a training scenarios. Our statewide team has implemented new equipment and technology

in-state trainings, our team out of state training to maintain certifications and skills. Our agency CNT members have also been busy with curriculum building for our very own Nebraska State Patrol Crisis Negotiation Basic Academy. The intent is to host a 40-hour block of instruction and build leader in training other officers or agencies within the CNT skill set. The Nebraska State

Patrol was also asked to help implement a new statewide association named Nebraska Association of Crisis **Negotiators** (NEACN). Ultimately NEACN will help foster teambuilding, training, and a yearly meeting/ competition for in-state and out of state law enforcement and corrections agencies. CNT members look forward to another successful year in 2022.



## **SWAT( Special Weapons and Tactics)**

NSP SWAT maintained a busy schedule in 2021. Troopers and Investigators assigned to SWAT responded to a wide array of incidents in 2021. Numerous incidents across Nebraska were handled including requests to assist with EMACs (Emergency Management Assistance Compacts) in Minnesota and Texas. In addition to deployments, they train regularly with other components of the NSP Special Operations Division: Airwing, Hazardous Device Technicians, Mobile Field Force, Negotiators, and Police Service Dogs. 2021 was also NSP SWAT's first calendar year working as one team covering calls across all six Troop Areas of Nebraska. Team members train to handle any number of situations they may be called upon to handle. Pictured are SWAT team members training for rope rescue as well as officer rescue in steep and rugged terrain.

The Nebraska State Patrol was involved in an active shooter

event in Juniata in August of 2021. The NSP SWAT Team, Crisis Negotiators, Police Service Dog Unit, Air Support Division, Hazardous Device Technicians, Patrol Operations, and Investigative Services Division all worked together after one of our own was injured by gunfire to bring this situation to an end. By using professionalism, flexibility, adaptability, teamwork, self-sacrifice and courage this was achieved.

## Special Operations

## **Aviation Support Division**

The Aviation Support Division is adding a new helicopter to the fleet!

The Bell 505 was flown from Montreal, Canada by Sgt. Brian Petersen and a Bell test pilot in early November. They flew to Piney Flat, Tennessee to a Bell Helicopter finish facility. The aircraft stayed in Tennessee for 10 days then it was moved to Dallas, Texas by Sgt. Petersen and Trooper Strack.

Currently the aircraft is at the finish facility with an anticipated put into service date for NSP operations by the end of February. This new platform will greatly assist and serve the state through more routine

patrolling and response to critical incident.

The staff continues to be prepared for future operations in North Platte with the training of Troopers Kelli

Nichelson and Michael Schmitt. Trp. Nichelson is a private pilot working towards her hours requirement to be signed off as a state approved pilot. Trp. Schmitt will be passing his private pilot check-ride with a FAA examiner.

The aviation support division



continues with its ongoing support in the form of my hours to federal agencies in the task force efforts to stop the distribution of methamphetamine and fentanyl along with other illicit drugs.

## **Police Service Dogs**

The Police Service Dog (PSD) Unit stayed busy during the last quarter of 2021.

Several handlers assisted with conducting the Fall Police Service Detector and Patrol Camp at the Nebraska State Patrol Training Academy. This camp contained not only NSP canine handlers but also several outside agency's handlers. Over 600 hours of instruction inclusive of PSD specific Instruction and Agency Instruction was achieved.

This quarter the Nebraska State Patrol added two new Police Service Dogs to the NSP PSD Unit: Trooper Austin Dooner's new partner, 93k Tilt and Trooper Brandon Wilkie's new partner, 464k Ezra.

As part of the statewide response for PSD needs, the

Nebraska State Patrol added one new Detector Canine Evaluator and one new Detector

Caine Instructor. These members were trained and certified by the Nebraska State Patrol. The Nebraska State Patrol trained and certified one lowa State Patrol PSD as well,

This was another fast faced quarter for the PSD teams as well. The eleven members conducted approximately 30 narcotic PSD deployments as well as approximately 6 explosive PSD deployment and about 40 Patrol and Tactical Dog deployments. The PSD united also obtained approximately 110 arrests this quarter.

Some other important responses by this group included School, Civic, and Organization Demonstrations along with narcotic sweeps at the schools.



## **Mobile Field Force (MFF)**

The Nebraska State Patrol's Mobile Field Force Teams consist of Troopers and Investigators from each of the six Troop Areas throughout Nebraska. During 2021, these Teams assisted in security at the Nebraska State Capitol during the 2021 Presidential Elections. The members also assisted with the agency's response to the states of Minnesota and Texas during EMAC requests. They also participated in a mock natural disaster (Patriot North Exercise) organized by the United States
Department of Defense Domestic Operations PATRIOT
21 which occurred during June
10 - 19, 2021 at Ft. McCoy
Wisconsin. The PATRIOT
exercise is sponsored by the
National Guard Bureau.

Members for the NSP MFF also attended their annual training in Hastings, Nebraska and a few were able to attend training in Alabama through the Homeland security.



## **Technical Crimes Division (TCU)**

The Technical Crimes Division has had a busy and productive year!

Investigators and analysts have been busy working hard to process cybertips and seek out predators harming children. Through December 2021, the Technical Crimes Division has served 25 search warrants, conducted 56 knock and talks, and made 59 arrests, which included several hands-on offenders.

The Technical Crimes Division computer lab has provided top quality support to both NSP personnel and allied agencies with a total of 1,193 forensic exams of cell phones, computers, and other devices The lab is also excited to move forward in 2022 with Cellerbrite Premium, a tool that will greatly

increase the amount of data extracted from cell phones.

This TCU also responded to 121 reports of cyber threats in the state. The TCU work closely with state and federal partners to monitor cyber threats and investigate incidents.



## Nebraska Information Analysis Center

The NIAC (Nebraska Information Analysis Center) Team has had a busy year.

In the NIAC division, analysts processed 1,082 tips and leads. This provided 156 leads to outside agencies for follow-up. NIAC analyst have also produced 22 Special Event Threat Assessments (SETA) to all events that took place in the state that had a Special Event Assessment Rating (SEAR).

The NIAC IT team is working hard on developing a new intel database. The Nebraska Information and Threat Exchange (NITE) will replace NFIN as the new database in July 2022.

Both centers received new work stations and the final touches are being put on camera equipment to monitor traffic, microwave downlink, and in-car cameras as well as redundancy in the phone system.

The division is now able to be

more competitive in the industry thanks to a well-deserved adjustments to wages that was implemented across many agencies in state government.

Finally, the division is excited to be finalizing a new trainer position in both Communications Centers. This position will add a new level of consistency statewide, in furtherance of the goal to make for a seamless transition whenever a center temporarily dispatches for another troop area.


